River Prairie Continues to Take Shape

Since the April release of the Altoona Citizen newsletter, River Prairie welcomed the opening of several businesses. In June, Cowboy Jack's opened to much fanfare. Around the same time, Edward Jones, Little Minds Matter, Massage Envy, and Prairie Place Apartments opened for business with great anticipation building for the opening of the Draganowski family-owned restaurant, Za 51. Progress in River Prairie Park has been steady. We can report the park area is coming

together nicely with the River Prairie Center opening its doors for operation, the installation of rail tree structures and pavers in the Front Porch Plaza, the manmade stream feature being turned on, and the amphitheater construction completed. Message from Police Chief Jesse James:

This month I will start my fifth year as your police chief for this great and growing city of ours. How the time has gone by so quickly! We have done some amazing things here at the police department and the future holds so much more. Going from the 49th safest city in Wisconsin to live in, to the 11th safest city is quite an accomplishment. This comes from the hard work, dedication, and service your police department thrives on. We accomplish this by being a team!

I am proud of the team we have at Altoona Emergency Services. The addition of our newest team member, Fire Chief Mark Renderman is truly a blessing. This allows more focus into team building and growth within police, fire and EMS, updating of policies to move us forward, and initiatives looking into officer safety, health, physical, spiritual and mental well-being. We must take care of our officers so we can continue "Putting Our Community First!"

This summer we mailed out 1,000 surveys to our citizens. Thank you to those who responded. We had over a 30 percent response, which is very impressive. I am pleased to see over 98 percent of citizens are satisfied with the services that the Altoona Police Department provides and over 98 percent believe our officers are competent while performing their duties. I was also happy to see 97 percent of you feel safe in your homes, but only 91 percent felt police presence was adequate in your neighborhood. Another key statistic was only 91 percent felt that traffic enforcement was adequate.

We are dedicated to improve services within our community. We cannot do this alone, we need our community, and we need partnerships from our citizens!

In 2018, we will initiate community based programs, but we will need your help. We are working on a police department webpage right now. This is scheduled to launch January 2018. It will include on-line citizen reporting, information regarding sex offenders, Wanted Wednesday subjects, photographs of found bikes-property, etc. Just a reminder, we have a Facebook page under Altoona Police Department (remember to "Like" us) and follow us on Twitter @altoonapolice.

We have interest in starting neighborhood watch programs, an idea on how to look at traffic and speed enforcement, and utilization of our police bikes more. We in law enforcement are exposed to many more dangers today than when we first started our careers. We have seen an increase in drug overdoses and prescription pill abuse as well as the exposure of fentanyl and carfentanil, and an increased call volume regarding mental health and suicide attempts. Altoona Public Library: A Busy 2017!

You'll notice some faces in the library have changed, but our commitment to serving you remains the same! Library Director Alyson Jones started in May; she comes to Altoona after six years as the director at the library in Fall Creek. Library Page Kay Anderson and Circulation Clerk Pam Peterson were regular library patrons who switched to the other side of the Circulation Desk in September. Kay worked as a page at L.E. Phillips Memorial Public Library; Pam was an assistant librarian in Cable, WI. Feel free to introduce yourself next time you are in!

The 2017 Summer Reading Program was a great success. We served 593 children and teens ages 17 and under. Our six-week program for children ages 11 and under offered 30 programs that had a total attendance of 1,483 participants! Additional drop-in programs ranging from a Wisconsin bird identification hide and seek challenge to various S.T.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) activities, kept youth engaged during their regular summer library visits. Thanks to parent feedback and interest, the library's summer reading program for children ages 11 and under will permanently be extended an extra week starting June, 2018.

The seven- week 2017 teen summer reading program offered 14 programs that 105 teens participated in. From Minecraft Club and Book Club, to various workshops and social gatherings, the library always offers a safe, friendly, and welcoming environment for our area teens.

There is something for all ages this fall at the library. Five story time sessions for toddlers thru preschool age are offered on a weekly basis through November 16th. The first week in December the library will offer eight morning and afternoon gross motor play sessions for toddlers and preschoolers as well. After school programs for children ages 4-12 include LEGO Club and reading with local therapy dog, Mocha Joe. The Ice Cream Reading Club will start up again this fall on November 13th and wrap up with a special ice cream story time and sundae bar the first Saturday in January, 2018.

During the school year, teens (grades 6-12) are welcome to attend the monthly TAB (Teen Advisory Board) meetings where they have an opportunity to meet other teens who are interested in planning social events for their peers at the library. For adults, we have four groups that each meet monthly: three book clubs (Food for Thought, Book Bites, and Book 'Em Mysteries') and an informal Saturday Knit and Crochet Club. We have grown-up Movie Nights; speakers on topics ranging from Bob Dylan, to baseball, to logging in Wisconsin; and programs where participants who are short on skill but long on enthusiasm make and take a No-Sew Farmer's Market Tote or a Book Lover's Gift in a Jar, both allmaterials- provided crafts completed in about an hour with step-bystep guidance. A Note About County Library Funding

You may be aware that there is a system of payments between municipalities in Eau Claire County for library use. If you are an Altoona city resident and check out materials at the Eau Claire library, for example, at the end of the year Altoona pays the Eau Claire library a certain cost per each item checked out. Conversely, Altoona receives funds for each item checked out by an Eau Claire city resident at our library. The amount per item changes yearly based on library circulation and expenses, but is often between \$3 and \$4. What does this mean for you? We want you to use library resources from any library in the way that works best for you. However, we'd like you to be aware that when you check out your items in Altoona, the city is not charged at the end of the year, even if those items came from another library in our MORE system. If you live in Altoona and pick up your items at a different library, some of your tax dollars will go to reimburse that library for your usage. 
NEW to Altoona: Back-in Angle Parking in River Prairie

Utilizing back-in angle parking in River Prairie was a way to create more parking spaces than using traditional parallel parking. Back-in angle parking uses 10 to 12 feet of lateral curb space per vehicle versus 22 feet of curb space for traditional parallel parking. In addition, back-in angle parking has proven to be safer in many cities across the United States. In Tucson, Arizona before back-in parking, Tucson had an average of three to four crashes per month with front-in angle parking compared to zero reported accidents for the first four years after the implementation of back-in angle parking. What are some of the benefits of angle back-in parking?

- Backing into a parking space is safer than backing into moving traffic.
- Clear sight lines when entering moving traffic.
- Safer when loading and un-loading: positions the trunk or back of the vehicle to the sidewalk, instead of into moving traffic making it a safer and easier way to load/unload items from your vehicle.
- Positions the driver and passengers, including children, to enter/ exit the vehicle towards the sidewalk instead of into moving traffic.
- It is easier than parallel parking.
- There are more parking spaces than parallel parking.

City of Altoona's Snow & Ice Control Procedures

The street department utilizes 5 trucks and 1 wheel loader for snow removal on Altoona's 44 miles of roads and streets. During emergency conditions (i.e. freezing rain, sleet or ice) crews are called out immediately. Salt is used when temperatures are above 10° to 15° F. For lower temperatures, a salt and sand mix is used. Priorities are hills and main roads with side streets to follow. Snow plowing begins when 3" of snow are on the street. A normal snow event of 8" or less will take crews approximately 6 or 7 hours to clear all roads and streets. A major snow event of 8" or more means that crews will work until all roads are plowed.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

- 1. Minimize travel during inclement weather.
- 2. Park your vehicle off-street in your driveway or garage.
- 3. City workers suggest that residents wait to shovel until snow plowing is finished on your street. Crews usually make 2 to 3 passes on each side of the street to clear it.
- 4. Sidewalks must be cleared of snow and ice within 24 hours following a snowfall or icy weather. Snow covered sidewalks can be reported to City Hall at cityhall@ci.altoona.wi.us or 715-839-6092.
- 5. If you have a fire hydrant in front of your home or business, please clear the snow around it.
- 6. Businesses and multi-dwelling residences are asked to be aware of the location of snow pile placement so as not to create a traffic hazard.
- Please make safety a priority, be patient and allow yourself extra travel time. Drive with caution and appropriate to the weather conditions.



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CITY PLANNING UPDATE

Strong Growth Continues

The pace of economic development in the Chippewa Valley continues to be robust, and Altoona is among the leading Cities in growth. One such indicator of growth is equalized property value per capita. Equalized property value is the property assessor's determination of the estimated market value of a property plus improvements, such as buildings. This value is "equalized" through a process conducted by the Wisconsin Department of Revenue to attempt to remove local variations and create a relatively consistent state-wide standard. It is upon this equalized value that property tax rates are applied.

Change in a particular property's value is due to a variety of factors, such as market demand, productive value, desirability of particular types or property or locations, overall regional wage and employment and employment conditions, and improvements such as renovations and new construction. Thus, at the City scale, changes in equalized value is one complex indicator of economic performance, as measured through actual property sales, owners improving their properties, new construction, as well as new property added to the City.

Cities grow or contract at various rates and for a variety of reasons. In order to account for change in estimated population, equalized value per capita is one metric used to compare relative growth between Cities. The following chart illustrates changes in population and equalized value for Cities in the Chippewa Valley. Equalized value is reflected in millions of dollars. Figures are not adjusted for inflation.

According to the Wisconsin Department of Administration, Altoona's estimated population in 2017 is 7,420. This represents an increase of 7.5 % since 2013, the fourth-highest rate of growth for a City in Wisconsin during that period. Equalized value in the City reached \$655.4 million by January 2017, up from \$423.6 million in 2013, an increase of 54.7 %. This corresponds to an increase in equalized value per capita of 43.9 %.

Questions inevitably arise as to the results of this growth. So what? Equalized value represents the local property tax base, and as such, rising values per capita means that local governments such as the City and School District may have greater resources to deliver services.

Approximately 33 percent of equalized value in Altoona is within one of three tax increment districts (TID), including River Prairie. In brief, tax revenue in these districts is captured to pay for public investments in infrastructure and amenities to stimulate private sector investment. It is not available for general fund budget allocations toward programs or investments elsewhere in the City. The City utilized TID out growth to hire two full-time employees in order to maintain a high level of service.

TIDs are the principal tool available to local government to finance economic development activities. Each tax increment district will close once their purpose is fulfilled and debt has been paid, allowing the revenue to be allocated normally to the City and other taxing jurisdictions. However, current Wisconsin state law requires that a half of the new growth in property value created by the district must allocated for property tax relief. The next tax increment district is expected to close in 2023.

The overall City budget will continue to change over time in response to growth, staff and program costs, changes in revenue from State programs, capital costs for roads and infrastructure, and other changes. It is not possible to project with a high degree of certainty what overall cost and revenue conditions will exist in 2023, as well as other important factors such as growth rates or unexpected changes. Thus, it is disingenuous to project what anticipated property tax rates will be in 2023. However, it is fair to say that significant increases in equalized value per capita, especially as compared to regional trends, is likely to place Altoona in a more favorable position with regard to municipal budget conditions than if the City grew below the regional baseline.

Communities in the Chippewa Valley are growing and investing in quality of life for citizens and visitors. Altoona has experienced strong growth in the past several years, growth which is expected to support the long-term vitality of the City.

Ordinance Enforcement

The Winter 2017 City of Altoona Newsletter provided a general update on the enforcement of City Ordinances, particularly those that address "nuisances". The City enforces building and zoning codes to ensure that the condition of property and the activities taking place conform to adopted standards. These standards are adopted to further public health, safety and welfare.

This issue will highlight a handful of frequently enforced ordinances as well as a few small but important things that help the City operate. The Altoona Municipal Code is available online www.ci.altoona.wi.us/government.phtml.

To ensure our streets and sidewalks remain safely passible, City ordinance 8.24 (D, F) require that trees and other plants are trimmed to enable free passage. By ordinance, this means that limbs should be at least 14 feet above the street or sidewalk. The City occasionally engages in proactive trimming of trees in the public boulevard, however if you notice branches hanging into the roadway or sidewalk, please contact the City for resolution.

The City does not trim trees on private property. If you notice or experience trees, bushes or long vegetation obstructing the street or sidewalk, please contact the City and we'll work with the property owner to clear the obstruction. Trees contribute many wonderful positive things to our City and environment, let's work together to make sure that they are both well cared for and manicured to avoid conflict.

Parking vehicles on unpaved surfaces is a frequent concern in Altoona. This is a concern because parking and driving on unpaved areas can deteriorate vegetation, and unstable or bare dirt is easily eroded and carried into the roadway and storm sewer system by vehicle tires as well as rain events. The City must regularly clear the storm sewer of sand and other debris that clog the system. Eroded material negatively impacts water quality of area lakes and streams, among other problems.

City code 10.21 requires that vehicles be parked on paved surface. Reasonably, driving or parking on a lawn for very short periods of time is likely to cause little harm to the grass. However, if repeatedly observed, the City will issue a warning. If erosion or conditions likely to cause erosion is documented, corrective action will need to be taken.

Among the common nuisance complaints are trash and other household items being kept outdoors. All refuse must be placed in durable containers with lids that resist pests, such as metal or hard plastic bins. Storing plush furniture such as chairs or mattresses outdoors is also prohibited, as they quickly deteriorate and become favorable habitat for undesirable insects and rodents. Please be sure to keep your refuse in containers and contact your garbage hauler to schedule pick-up of large items or loads.

Leaves are mostly down, and City staff frequently receives questions about what to do with leaf piles. The City of Altoona does not operate a yard waste site. Dumping of yard waste on public property, including the street, is prohibited. Eau Claire County maintains a directory of haulers and landscape sites that pick up or accept yard waste. Burning permits are strictly required unless contained within a pit or ring made of brick or metal and not more than 3 feet in diameter. Burning of refuse is prohibited, and all burning may be prohibited if conditions readily allow for a fire to spread.

Winter is coming! Hold your Game of Thrones references. Clearing snow from the sidewalks around your property is expected of all residents and businesses. This serves to ensure that people can move around safely. Be sure to pile snow on the boulevard or on your property, as clearing snow into the street is not permitted.

If you do receive a warning notice from the City, please respond as soon as you are able and contact City Hall if you have any questions or clarifications. Most of the time these are reminders and the resolution is relatively simple. The goal is compliance, and deadlines are intended to provide for a reasonable time frame for resolution. Municipal citations are issued only when cooperation is not provided.

If you see a property condition or non-emergency activity that raises your concern, please contact City Hall at 715-839-6092 or cityhall@ci.altoona. wi.us. For emergencies or immediate health and safety threats, contact the Police Department by calling 911. To assist staff in investigating the concern, please include the address, description, and pictures if possible. Most complaint investigations begin within two business days.

With your help, the City of Altoona continues to be a safe, clean, and vibrant place to live, work, and play.

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FIRE DEPARTMENT UPDATE

FIRE HYDRANTS AND SNOW

I know it is hard to think about winter being on the approach, but it will be here in a few weeks. As the snow starts to fly and it stacks up and up and up, please keep an eye on those fire hydrants in your neighborhood. When a call comes in for a fire, fire hydrant connection is a priority for our fire crews to fight fires. We are asking everyone to help keep an eye on those hydrants to make sure that the snow is shoveled around them so we when we are called for a fire call in your neighborhood, the hydrants are easier to locate. If you have a hydrant in your yard and there are trees and brush obstructing it, please remove it to allow easier access.

2018 Dog License

- State law mandates that your dog(s) be licensed (see WI Statute 174).
- The City of Altoona limits the number of pets at a household business to 2 dogs and 3 cats (see Altoona Municipal Code, **Chapter 6.08).**
- Owners of unlicensed dogs are subject to a \$169 fine plus
- At the time of this publication, City Council is working on the 2018 budget and dog license fees have not been established for 2018. It is anticipated that the dog license fees will be determined by December 1, 2017 and the dog license application will be available on-line at that time. HELP EMERGENCY RESPONDERS **HELP YOU** By Mark Renderman, Altoona Fire Chief

As emergency responders, it is critical to locate our community residents in their time of need. When the 911 call comes into the communications center, they collect information to dispatch our teams by providing emergency responders with a street and an address number. As we are responding to the location we are dispatched to, we utilize house or building numbers which are normally visible on the street side of the home or building. If these numbers are not present, or are not marked clearly on your home or building, this situation creates confusion for responders, which ultimately could result in a delay in providing the requested emergency interventions.

Please help us by taking a look at your home or building to confirm that your address number is completely visible from the roadway. Over time the trees, shrubs, and other plants tend to flourish and block these numbers. At times, we also conduct normal home and/or building maintenance such as painting and new siding, which requires us to remove the numbers. Please make sure those numbers are placed back onto the house or building in the correct street side location.

Altoona Municipal Code 8.26, Address Identification sets out the rules for affixing your address to your residence and other buildings. Please the graphic below to see if you address meets this code.

Do I need a permit to burn brush, leaves, grass clippings or other garden materials?	Yes, a burning permit is required. You can obtain a permit from the Altoona Fire Department located in the Emergency Services Building at 1904 Spooner Avenue. Suggestion: Call the Altoona Fire Department at 715-839-2970 to see if weather conditions are favorable for burning.	
Do I need to shovel my sidewalk?	Yes, sidewalks must be cleared of snow and ice within 24 hours following a snowfall or icy weather. Snow/ice covered sidewalks can be reported by sending an e-mail to: cityhall@ci.altoona.wi.us or by calling 715-839-6092.
